Following his email earlier this year, I heard from **Charles Todd**. "My wife and I made it back to Killerton House in September for the sentimental visit I mentioned to you last month. The day was generally bright with a few scattered showers and we wandered around the magnificent grounds, including the Bear and Ice Houses, before having a bite to eat in the canteen and afterwards touring the house.

I told the volunteer at the front door I had emailed the house team in advance of my visit, hoping I might be given a behind-the-scenes tour as I was a former resident of the house. The house manager was summoned and he did take Lin and I around the building to the unseen places, excluding the cellars. I have to admit I was rather disappointed (as often is the case for those who try to prise something out of the past) with what I saw. The house has been shamefully reconfigured (or should I say disfigured) by the National Trust in its drive towards creating as many offices, storage areas and nondescript spaces as it can from the original, well proportioned layout. I suspect you know this from your own tours of the house over the years. However, the show rooms still evoke the feelings and memories

of the past. The reception hall, which the babbyfoot table once graced, still felt the same, as did the music room -even now with a piano in it- the "tv room" and the library. I remember one Saturday night being almost alone in the house watching some Hammer Horror film on the tv in the tv room (naturally) with a wild storm raging outside; it was very atmospheric and it all came back to me as I walked through the house. The grand sweep of the staircase, with certain oil paintings which appear to be in the same places they occupied during my time there, remains a signature feature. The understairs cupboard, where once the telephone resided, conjured up memories of waiting in a queue to use the apparatus to make the weekly call home reassuring my parents I was alive and kicking. The bedroom I slept in has now been swallowed up in the exhibition spaces and it is difficult to pinpoint the exact dimensions of the room. We also visited the chapel. It is a strange space. Gothic in style, cold in mood and remarkably unspiritual in nature considering its purpose. I never liked the building and I still don't."

John Brand contacted me to point out a posting on Facebook of the St Luke's rugby 7s team after winning the famous Middlesex 7's and being presented with the trophy by Sir Douglas Bader - it says in 1973.



I received an email from **Keith Davies**. He was a PE student who moved to Killerton in 1963 when it first opened. Other PE students he remembers include John Nash, David Ratcliffe, Chris Brenton and Ray Peate(still alive and very active).

He recalls helping to clean the cellars and set up a resident Bar. John Nash was an exparachuter and took on the responsibility for the running of the bar and social activities.

He is still in contact with. Ray Peate, David Ratcliffe and possibly Chris Brenton but also with Roger Jones who was the lead singer in the musical group who started the musical entertainment in the cellars of Killerton House. The group was called "Trio Less Dead Loss".
