John relates: "in 1972 Mike Morrey and I were watching Barry John, Willie John McBride, and Don Rutherford, on the 1st XV pitch, making a rugby coaching film for Midland Bank. The director had Lukies charging at Barry John while he jinked and then landed drop goals with either foot! Apparently Mike's wife Judith was a real fan of "The King" (as labelled by several New Zealand journalists after the famous Lions victory in the test series v. the All Blacks in 1971) - I convinced Mike to ask for his autograph for Judith. The icon said "No problem" then added "I'm doing you a favour aren't I!". Nice."

I received a note from Jim Brock (1966) who reports "I left Luke's and taught in special education (EBD) for 22years. I also became a Christian and led several churches for 30 + years. I am now a Chaplain in HMP Parc near Bridgend. I have two married sons and four grandchildren, one a doctor, one a nurse and two at university."

Finally a note from Dick Henly: "I'm enjoying my time back out here on the Canadian Pacific coast. Evidently some people get bored in retirement which is a concept I simply don't understand.
